"Universal coverage for medically necessary health care services provided on the basis of need, rather than the ability to pay."

For the most part, home and continuing care services are not covered by the Canada Health Act.








Private Senior Care Services




- Accessed directly

- No government assistance




Why would someone consider Private?



- Ineligible does not meet
 Assessment benchmarks of publicly funded Care
- Looking for flexibility and customized Care options
- Need wider range of services through one Care Manager






e.g. Home Care



- High Demand, limited capacity
- Need for extreme customization
- Matter of choice
- "Not burdening the system further"
- Need for flexibility
- Expensive
- Lack of Standards (Accreditation)




Statistics Canada (2018)



1.2m Canadians needed Home Care;

- 26% had their needs unmet
- Barriers availability, characteristics, cost, ineligibility
- 52% paid solely by government
- 27% paid solely out-of-pocket
- 7% paid solely through insurance



Canadian Medical Association (2021)




- By 2031, nearly twice as many older adults will require care.
- Costs will grow from \$29.7B/yr in 2019 to \$58.5B/yr in 2031
- 2019 LTC waitlist was 77,000



BC Seniors Advocate (2019)



- 15% (4200 beds) of LTC residents could be living in the community
- An LTC bed costs \$27,740/yr more than providing 2hrs of Home Support
- 63% of Home Support clients, get less than 1 hr/day
- One third of family Caregivers are in distress




BC Seniors Advocate (2019)



2014 to 2019


- # of seniors increased by 22%, but Home Support clients increased only by 15%
- Home Support hours for 85+ decreased by 10.3%
- Complaints to Patient Care Quality office increased by 62%



BC Care Providers Association



- Care for over 12,000 seniors each day in residential care and assisted living.
- Care for 11,000 British Columbians each day at Home



On the North Shore




- Higher density of Seniors

- "Competing" private services









September 2

September 8

Deadline for reporting staff and resident vaccination information to the Vaccine Reporting Portal. Contact: VaccPortalSupport@gov.bc.ca

September 13

Rapid Testing for unvaccinated staff begins

October 11

The last date staff can get their second dose of COVID vaccine in time to be fully vaccinated for the deadline of October 12



October 12

Only fully vaccinated (have received second dose of COVID vaccine longer than seven days previous) can work in long-term care homes or assisted living residences

Ongoing

Masks are required for all staff and visitors (except fully vaccinated visitors while in single-occupancy rooms)

Ongoing

Proof of vaccination from visitors and outside healthcare and service providers is required
